The Freedom of Information (Scotland) Act 2002 The Freedom of Information (Scotland) Act 2002 (or "FOISA") came into force on 1 January 2005. Under FOISA, a person who requests information from a Scottish public authority which holds it is entitled to be given it by the authority subject to certain conditions and exemptions set out in the Act.

The Freedom of Information (Scotland) Act In 2019 the definition of Scottish public authority was broadened to include all Registered Social Landlords in Scotland, including Trust. The Act grants the public the right to access recorded information held by Trust and, apart from where a specific exemption applies, Trust must comply and supply the information within 20 working days.
